


Stay in the Know

Christie was nominated for a student advisor position on Student Disability Service's (SDS) Student Advisory Board (SAB), whose purpose is to consult and collaborate with SDS in order to better the experience for disabled students at the University of Iowa through advocacy, education, and awareness, and to promote the values of diversity, equity, and inclusion, during their undergrad and earned a seat on the board shortly afterwards.

Christie also moonlights as the DEI Director at the Daily Iowan, working directly with Amplify editors to uplift marginalized voices.

Christie is also an avid volunteer, volunteering for organizations like Hospice, The Bird House, and Habitat for Humanity. They have given various speeches on behalf of organizations and in 2018, they spoke at the Integrated Voter Assembly hosted by the Johnson County Interfaith Coalition and the Iowa City chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) concerning the lack of affordable housing and resources in Iowa City.
